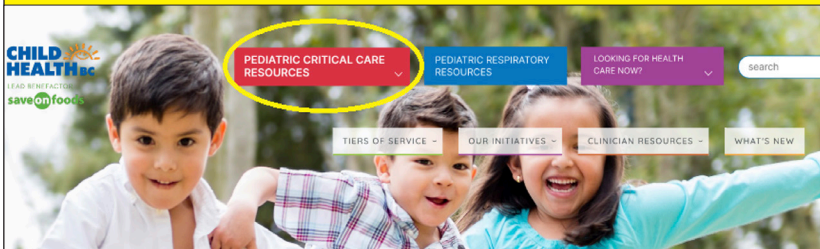
THE PROJECT GOALS

P-VCS <small>PICU Virtual Clinical Support</small> PICU Virtual Clinical Support: Support the remote care of critically ill children, and provide timely clinical follow-up to the sending team of transferred PICU patients.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • GoodSAM resulted an inadequate platform for virtual clinical support and the team decided to switch to Zoom for Health Care. • The workflows for virtual rounding and debrief of critical incidents were developed. • Resources available to support providers using Zoom: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Provincial Pediatric Virtual Support Pathways: Link ○ Zoom Videoconferencing for Transport Consultations. • Workflow for Sending Providers Needing PICU/NICU Support: link 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Zoom platform will be evaluated until the end of April 2025 • Invite families and caregivers to share their experience with video consultation.
StEP <small>Stabilization Essentials in Pediatrics</small> Education: Inter-professional education for health care providers.	In 2024, the course has been delivered in: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Island Health (Nanaimo Regional General Hospital – Nanaimo) • Interior Health (Thomson Rivers University – Kamloops) • Since 2023, 102 participants received in person training: 42 RNs, 35 MDs and 25 RTs since 2023. • 95% of participants affirmed that the course met their learning needs, has directly benefited patient care, and will recommend it to a colleague. • Participants reported that the knowledge gained from the StEP course changed their management of critically ill children and influenced guidelines, practices, or tools at their workplaces. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Continue implementation of the PDSA cycle: curriculum improvement, report creation, and general course organization. • Explore the 2025 dates and locations.
PCCL <small>Pediatric Critical Care Learning</small> Case Driven Education: Interdisciplinary review of community cases requiring pediatric critical care.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • More than 1070 participants registered with an average of over 100 participants per session. • Participants include nurses, physicians, and respiratory therapists. • Subspecialists invited to co-facilitate the sessions with the PICU team. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Debrief and analyze lessons learned from the sessions. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Feedback from participants and facilitators ○ Implement evaluation and the PDSA cycle: • Ongoing call-out for case presentations – send an email to ped.critical.care.project@phsa.ca or click here) • Next Session: September 20, 1 pm.
PICA CHU Follow-Up: Goal: develop a feasibility study for a Follow-up network	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The team evaluated the current state of follow-up after admission to a pediatric intensive care unit in BC, and identified health domains which were not being routinely supported for children and families after discharge. • Feedback from surveys and focus groups allowed the team to determine the services required for a post-PICU follow-up strategy. • In addition, the team uncovered community clinicians' barriers to providing optimal care for children and families after PICU discharge. • Educational resources such as the roadmap to recovery were developed. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The post-PICU follow-up service trial will start with 10 families in the summer and the final evaluation and feasibility testing will be implementing in 2025.

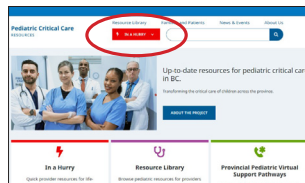
